Debate

Texts:

"I've chaired loads of things in the Trade Union Movement and Labour Party. I always start by saying, 'I was trained in the Woodcraft Folk' – because Tony Raine taught me how to chair a meeting. Completely different to how a political meeting is chaired...I became a venturer leader (at 19) which we called 'Dennis Goldberg Venturers'. I met him at the Annual Conference. I took delegations to France and Spain, to big anti-apartheid camps. When I was young and enthusiastic, I got energy. You lived and breathed Woodcraft...It was my first Love."

"Changes? A lot in 1970s. National folk decided to be a large organisation and lots of groups started, some with very little or no knowledge of Woodcraft Folk history. They hadn't got the feel or beliefs. Maybe they were CND members or Quakers or Labour party but not Woodcraft Folk." Joan Pover, 2000

"Being given the opportunity to help co-ordinate events, lead workshops and have responsibility for the well being of others has given me a lot of unique experiences for a young person... Woodcraft has made a massive difference to my life' I've met some of the coolest people I know and developed some really genuine Friendships." Sadie (19), 2025

Naming

Text:

"Badger was very explicit in telling us why we had folk names, that it was to give us all a sense of equality, not only between the boys and the girls, but between the children and the adults. There was no Sir or Miss or Mrs or anything. All the names were equal.

We were encouraged to choose a name which had some connection with our character, or our build, or our colouring, or something, and he would say, as an example, Leslie Paul chose the name Little Otter because he had dark sleek hair and he was an excellent swimmer."

"Badger's old naming ceremony was similar to a christening where folk parents are appointed. I adapted it to keep a non-religious Woodcraft naming ceremony. I only slightly changed the language to non-gender specific terms."

Peace

Text:

Fenner Brockway acknowledged his wife, Lilla Brockway, had the foresight "that those who intended to refuse military service should band themselves together."

Founder of 'No Conscription Fellowship'. In 1926, Fenner presided over the annual conference of the No More War Movement at Birmingham and was the Chair of the IFM 1948.

Henry 'Koodoo' Fair coordinated travel of children from Czech socialist internationalist families, 'in peril of their life, hundreds are refugees, sleeping in fields and ditches...now comrades here is our chance to show our solidarity with our Czech Comrades. Can you take a boy or a girl or perhaps two boys or girls? Talk this over immediately." Woodcraft Circular, November 1938

Text:

"My Dad, [Richard] he's 82 now, first heard about Woodcraft Folk on Aldermaston march. There was a guy he knew who knew all the organisations. Woodcraft Folk came in all their green costumes, and they were all singing the same songs, and he was like, 'Who are these people?'...He said, 'when I have kids they're going there, so when my sister was born she went in the 80s, and I went in the 90s up to now." Sex & Gender

Text:

"In early days (of Woodcraft), it just seemed natural that some leaders male, some female. The more responsible jobs were taken by the men folk. I don't remember anyone challenging this not for many many years. It did crop up in the 60s I suppose. Leaders of large districts nearly always men and head office. There was a push for women to take more responsible parts." Joan Pover, 2000

"A Folk family is one where traditional roles are dropped. You are much more likely to find shared roles within a folk family where parents are looking after children, so that one or the other can help in the Group or go to a meeting or go to a camp or whatever...I felt it was a movement for peace and second it brought boys and girls together and I was all in favour of that. And it did have some ideals behind it as well. We all grew up equals. 'We are one Blood'." Chrys Salt, 1985

"There aren't many places where it's OK, whether your gay, trans, cis, whatever, it doesn't matter...we've done campaigning, everyone needs respect." Venturer, 2025
